- **Organized and Accessible Materials:** Shelves and toys are always available, organized logically, and accessible to infants. This supports independent exploration and fosters a sense of autonomy.
- **Engaged Educators:** Educators are active participants in play, offering guidance, encouragement, and opportunities for growth. They are essential in facilitating learning and building on each infant's prior experiences.
